How much can a Communications Major earn?

As of Jun 21, 2023, the average hourly pay for the Communications Major jobs category in the United States is \$35 an hour. While ZipRecruiter is seeing hourly wages as high as \$63.46 and as low as \$14.66, the majority of wages within the Communications Major jobs category currently range between \$24.04 (25th percentile) to \$37.74 (75th percentile) across the United States. The average pay range for a Communications Major job varies greatly (by as much as \$13.70), which suggests there may be many opportunities for advancement and increased pay based on skill level, location and years of experience. Individuals who have majored in communications can greatly benefit from breaking into the public relations world. This specific sector greatly rewards individuals that have the required specialized expertise, experience and proven positive track record. The national average for an entry-level profession in the public relations industry is approximately \$50,000 a year. (Best Communications Degrees).
